### Description

HTML meant to display literally which figures inside the body of a call to the QUOTE plugin is quietly ignored, as if it had been stripped. This happened on ticket #4235. As can be seen in the history (version 5), I had to give up on QUOTE to keep the code displayed.

### Solution

This is a regression from r20911. Simply reverting the first line addition to wikiplugin\_quote.php will fix.

Would a filter that escapes all HTML would be best here?

If that line is in any way needed for security, there is something very wrong with the parser (so what we would really need is to fix the parser or put some security kludge in the parser meanwhile).

A filter which does not "lose" data would be better, yes, but the best is to do what's needed for proper behavior - keep the data unaltered.

Filtering has nothing to do with the parser. All untrusted data is filtered to prevent potential attacks and to limit user data to expected parameters. The parser can't be expected to find and block attacks. Its job is to convert wiki syntax into something useful. Even IP addresses are filtered because that data can be spoofed, and is thus untrustable. So sorry, but there is no way around some level of chance that the data could be altered. Without that there would be no possibility of preventing malicious code from swamping every Tiki install on the web. So I'm afraid the only realistic options I see is for a more suitable filter to be selected, or for a new filter to be created, or perhaps a fix to a filter that is not returning expected results.

The parser has no more and no less to do with filtering than any other component. The parser doesn't have to block attacks per se, it simply needs to handle data correctly.

I do not understand what you mean by "but there is no way around some level of chance that the data could be altered".
